Bunker

The inspiration I have been so very blessed to experience for the past 12 years is a little 18 pound, fluffy white, four-legged miracle named Bunker. I adopted Bunker from a puppy mill in Missouri in 2010. His litter of five was going to be euthanized because each one of the puppies had a slight deformative and could not be sold for show dogs. Bunker was bow-legged. My friends adopted his three sisters and brother, and I was blessed with Bunker.



Once Bunker and I settled into puppyhood, I was beginning to think about what I would do once I retired from my career. I knew I wanted to contribute in some way so decided Bunker and I would launch into dog therapy together. Having no dog training, but always loved animals being raised on a farm, I felt we could take on this challenge together.

After our first year together, Bunker and I completed our training and passed our tests to be a certified dog therapy team with Animal Samaritans here in the Coachella Valley. I think Bunker and I both had our doubts in the beginning that we had the temperaments this was going to be our destiny, but Bunker was incredible patience with me, and we made it.

Our first assignments were here in the Coachella Valley visiting challenged grade school children to help them read. They would read to Bunker but would not read to adults. We also visited abused families in shelters around the valley to give them comfort and joy. I was becoming amazed witnessing Bunker and his interaction with his newfound friends. He just knew what to do.

After several years here in the valley, we moved to the Phoenix area. Bunker and I had to be re-certified as a dog therapy team and get connected into the Arizona dog-therapy environment. We were so fortunate to learn of Phoenix Children's Hospital, a 500-bed pediatric acute hospital. This hospital has an entire department within Patient Services that manage dog therapy team visits with 55 dogs visiting the children (newborns to 18 years old) 8 hours a day, 7 days a week. The dog visits were prescribed by the physicians depending on the specific child's needs. Bunker and I began by working four days a week, 5 hours shifts a day, visiting 5 -10 patients a day and became one of two dogs in the program that were prescribed for "communication" by the physicians. I would like to share two of the many heartwarming and inspirational stories of our work at the hospital.

We were prescribed to visit Melody, a 6 year old girl that had come to the hospital badly abused by her family. She would not talk to the nurses, the doctors, Bunker, or me. We continued to visit Melody 3 days a week for over a month and finally she spoke. We were getting ready to leave our visit with Melody one day and she said "I love you Bunker!" and gave him a big hug for the first time. She knew she could trust Bunker. Over the course of several weeks forward she would only talk to and hug Bunker and then finally she gained trust in a few of the nurses and began talking.

We were prescribed to visit Brandon, a 13-year-old boy that had come to the hospital with severe brain damage after jumping off a freeway overpass. He had been in the hospital for about a month when we were first prescribed to visit Brandon. He was starting to show progress but would not speak to his family members. Over weeks of visits where Bunker would snuggle up beside Brandon and share these long stares Brandon gradually began working on his homework, but only when his parents or other adults were not in his room and Bunker was at his side.

Over the course of several weeks Brandon continued to progress with his learning but only when Bunker was beside him, so they increased Bunker's visits with Brandon to 4 days a week. He would stop if a family member or other adult came into the room. It was eventually determined Brandon's incident was caused by being so traumatized from the pressure to make perfect grades from his family. There was no pressure from Bunker. He again seemed to communicate with Brandon in such a way he understood as acceptance and trust.

Bunker receives Christmas cards from Melody, Brandon, and several other children from the hospital still today. They are all happy and doing extremely well.

Going from room to room, up and down the floors of the hospital to visit Bunker's patients so often we would hear an infant crying and Bunker would bee line to the crying baby's door. The nurses would invite us to come in and I would put Bunker up on the bed beside the baby and he would snuggle his nose under the baby and miraculously the baby would stop crying.

Several years later Bunker and I moved back to the desert and joined HOPE, a national dog therapy organization that focuses on disasters. We visited the sites destroyed by the fires up and down the West coast in 2017 adding comfort to devastated families and emergency support teams. These were heart-wrenching assignments as well. However, as in the hospital after each visit there were always sparks of inspiration felt.

After 12 wonderful years witnessing the miracles of Bunker, he continues to give unconditional love and communicate in ways I will never understand. Today we visit hospice patients as a dog therapy team with Destiny Hospice, and the smiles and small little pats on Bunker's head continue to bring such joy and inspiration to me every single day. He truly is a little miracle God has given to so many.

The Iowa Wave Inspiration

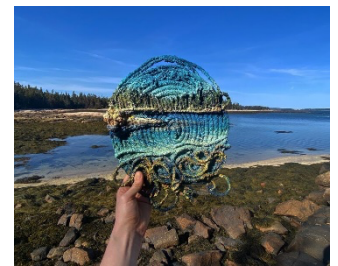
