<u>Pastor Bill's</u> "September Speculations!"



By the time you get this, Joyce and I will be back from a week at our Timeshare in Carlsbad where we catch up on beach weather, some time around the pool, reading and reading, and visiting family. Two of who live in San Diego and two of whom live on Balboa Island.

Many blessed things have been taking place this past month or two: First, we now have a new website

ps-pc.com - check it out for audio, new formant, etc., thanks to Alex Danson, who is our pianist and choir director on Sundays and web-master on Mondays! Second, remodeling of the kitchen is in progress and not far from completion. Granted it will not be a restaurant size kitchen, nor even gourmet-like, but it will be functional and beautiful - BEAUTIFUL ~ and dedicated to the glory of God, not just the growls of our stomachs - thanks to the Kitchen Committee Co-chaired by Jackie Morgan and Margaret Pace along with Barbara Stephens, Jan Perrier, Jim DeHart, and Donna McCullen: new cabinets, a Corian counter top, beautiful new refrigerator and two new stoves and microwaves, etc., etc. Something we will use for ourselves and for our neighborhood. Third, the Chancel (sometimes called "the Stage") has been remodeled opening up our sense of the beauty of our sanctuary by removing what I call "the Barrier" and by lowering the height of the Chancel floor thus making it more receptive to singing to the glory of God. The cost of the work on the Chancel has been made possible by an anonymous donor who is/are committed Christians, active Presbyterians, but not members or even regular attendees of PSPC. Aren't we blessed? Fourth, a number of electrical problems have been, and are being, tackled and corrected thanks to Ernie Moore, who is a dear friend of PSPC and to Jim DeHart who has spent hours tracking down remote controls, fans, etc. We are in the process of fixing the fans in the Sanctuary, adding to them remote controls for variable speeds, which will help, make the Sanctuary comfortable during our long, hot summers. **Fifth**, we still have work to do on the stained glass windows to protect and seal them, and to redo the stucco on the sides of the church but that will come and if anyone wants to provide some extra finances (beyond your annual pledge to the annual budget or your building pledge) to help accomplish these needs, please see either me, or Jim DeHart, Clerk of Session. And, if you desire, your gift will be kept confidential. Sixth, but not last and certainly not least, is the work of Jeff Morgan our audio for Sundays (and sometimes Thursdays) - a seldom seen, but vital ministry to add to the website, to help us not only see but hear the spoken word and the music. Aren't we blessed?

It is September - fall is quickly coming; Winter Residents (aka Snowbirds) will soon be arriving (for which we are delighted) and neighborhood kids are getting back in school. We have such a great opportunity to share the Good News of Jesus with so many! What would you like to do help us do this? This past July, Sue Cooper and Joyce Johnson participated in the Palm Desert Community Presbyterian Church's Vacation Bible School to help begin thinking about, and preparing for, a VBS for our neighborhood next summer, 2010. You are needed, will you help?

PDA UPDATE FOM MORELLA LARSEN

Morella Larsen is home in Salem, OR. following her PDA trip to Alaska. She helped to set up an emergency disaster task force at University Community Presbyterian Church in Fairbanks. This church has become a vital part of the process by opening its doors to provide bed and board and airport shuttles for the building crews that are flown in and out of the villages along the eastern part of the

Yukon River, where homes were destroyed by floods last spring. Working two week shifts are the Mennonites, Christian Reformed World Relief Commission and Samaritans Purse who are constructing kit homes, which are barged up the Yukon. The short summer and the expectation of snow "Sept. 15" add an urgency not felt in most

disaster re-builds. Morella and her teammate, Harvey Howell (San Antonio, TX), representing PCUSA's PDA were invited to Alaska to assist by the Presbyter, Dr. Rev. Curt Karn, of the Yukon Presbytery. They trained members of several churches in Fairbanks and Anchorage in the processes for recover. PDA is a member of FEMA's Voluntary Organizations Active in Disasters' (VOAD). The efforts of recovery will soon

need to be suspended because of the coming harsh winter (minus 60-70 degree temperatures) and plans are under way to start up again in the spring, working on west on the 1000 mile long Yukon River. Alaska is more than twice the size of Texas, making the distance and lack of roads to the villages a challenge in providing assistance. Morella is one of 58 people nationwide in the National Response team for PDA. Thank you, Morella, for the good work you do.

BE TRANSFORMED

It's Labor Day weekend — a time to rest from our labors. But this is also an opportunity to reflect on our daily work and discern whether our effort is thankless and uninteresting or something that gives us deep and lasting satisfaction. From Frances Gotenstein's Kitchen **Key Lime Pie**

2 c graham cracker crumbs 1/2 c sugar, plus 2 tbsp, divided

4 tbsp unsalted butter, melted

4 egg yolks 1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk

1/2 c fresh key lime juice or regular lime juice

3/4 c chilled heavy cream

Sliced limes for garnish

1. Preheat oven to 350 deg. 2. Combine graham cracker crumbs, 1/2 cup sugar and butter. 3. Press mixture over bottom and up sides of 9" glass pie plate. 4. Bake crust in middle of oven for 10 minutes; let cool. 5. Whisk together egg yolks, condensed milk and lime juice. Pour mixture into crust. 6. Place on baking sheet and bake for 15 minutes, or until center is set. 7. Cool on wire rack for 1 hour. Refrigerate 4 hours or overnight. 8. In medium bowl beat cream until frothy. Add 2 tbsp sugar and continue beating until still peaks form. 9. Spread over pie and garnish with lime slices.
